Estimada Comunidad,

On Friday, September 20, 2019, a young Latino organizer stood behind a podium and a large crowd of over 8,000 community members on the stairs of the Minnesota Capitol. Under scorching sunrays magnified by the white marble steps, he reflected on his life journey up to this point. How is it that Marco and other student leaders of color could become such a powerful voice in the state's climate movement?

Comunidades Organizando el Poder y la Acción Latina (or COPAL) formed in January 2018 with the goal of uniting Latinxs in Minnesota in active grassroots communal democracy that builds racial, gender, social and economic justice across community lines. Since launching, the organization has grown to include 7 staff members, a base of 150+ volunteers, and over 10,000 supporters across the state. In addition, this year, it has gained a 501(c)(3) and 501(c)(4)legal status, creating greater opportunities for community service as well as direct political action. Forever in gratitude for the support of TakeAction Minnesota, COPAL will be operating as a totally independent organization. With new energy, COPAL is uplifting Latino voices across the state and building community power.

This year, COPAL has further developed programs to advance its core mission with regards to the Environment, Democracy 2050, Education, Immigration, and Leadership.

2020 will be full of challenges. The Census and the 2020 elections will have serious implications for years to come. Underpinning work in both areas is a struggle between two world views: a world view that cages immigrant children, concentrates wealth in fewer hands, and ignores the human-made environmental catastrophes impacting the Earth and its people; and a people-driven world view that embraces a shared humanity and prioritizes the need to protect the planet. COPAL, committed to advancing the people's world view, plans to engage thousands of Latinxs across the state to participate in the upcoming election and the U.S. Census.

## Action

#### Immigration - Citizenship:

COPAL's Citizenship Classes are an opportunity for members of the community who are eligible to take the test required to become a citizen of the United States. COPAL community leaders walk students through the learning process, provide legal advice, and build relationships within the classroom. This year, 60 students joined COPAL in preparing for their citizenship tests.

The Minnesota USCIS (United States Citizenship and Immigration Services) office has a backlog of 17,000 applications. Due to went up from six months to twenty-four months. Plus, there are close to 9 million immigrants nationwide that are eligible for citizenship but haven't applied. So, COPAL is encouraging the community to naturalize is encouraging the community to naturalize now to get the right to vote later. This year, student leaders from the Citizenship Class program met with Representative Angie Craig to make the case for why her office should advocate for citizenship issues.

#### Immigration – TPS:

There are about three hundred thousand people in the United States from 13 different countries with Temporary Protected Status (TPS), whose status was put in jeopardy by the Trump administration. Minnesota is home to about five thousand TPS holders. So, COPAL has made TPS advocacy part of its core programming. Leaders of the Minnesota TPS Campaign met with members of the Minnesota congressional delegation, advocating for permanent residency. As a result of community powerbuilding and advocacy, TPS recipients won the fight for a 1-year extension.

### Environment:

Climate change and resource extraction have created economic and environmental refugees across the world. So, COPAL is building power with frontline communities to pass environmental policies that ensure everyone benefits from a green economy. COPAL's Climate Justice Team facilitated a tour for Wendy Cruz, a Honduran ecotour for Wendy Cruz, a Honduran eco-

The team also organized a delegation to Central America to learn about the region's environmental degradation and the political & social issues that push people to migrate. And, moving to build political power, the team will introduce climate justice legislation in the upcoming 2020 MN legislative session.

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Minnesota risks losing 1 of its 8 congressional seats because of a Census undercount. So, COPAL is working to ensure a complete Census count as part of its inclusive Democracy program. This year, COPAL collected over 1,000 Census Pledges: "Yes, We Count-Invisibles No Más." A full-census campaign will be implemented in March-September of 2020.

Politicians have tried to scare immigrant communities away from participating in the Census. However, it is important that every person be counted regardless of documentation, because the Census is used to determine vital community resources, such as funding for schools and hospitals.

It is safe to participate. By law, the Census cannot release identifiable information about an individual for 72 years. By participating in the Census, a community member makes their power visible and their community stronger.

# Action

### Education:

Minnesota consistently ranks among the top states for education, but is also among the worst in terms of racial inequality, routinely failing students of color. Due to an unmet resource need, Latino students are falling behind. So, COPAL is organizing with parents of students attending Minneapolis Public Schools to increase the graduation rate among Latinx students.

Early in 2019, COPAL began organizing with parents whose children are attending Minneapolis district released the first version of the Comprehensive District Design (CDD).
