This 24,000 square foot space at 2905 E Lake Street, a building damaged during the 2020 summer protests in Minneapolis, signifies more than just physical reconstruction. This project represents a pivotal step in empowering our community. It is a return of land ownership to local residents and it reinforces Latines' historical presence along Lake Street. The LCCE will build power with and fulfill the ambitions of our young and diverse community, fostering pride and belonging. It will be where dreams grow and where COPAL's innovative programs bring our Minnesota Latine community's aspirations to life.

## **Environmental Justice**

In December, Carolina Ortiz, Associate Executive Director of COPAL, joined a team of other Minnesota climate leaders at the global climate summit, COP28, in Dubai. The diverse delegation from Minnesota was organized by Climate Generation and included teachers, youth, activists, storytellers, artists, scientists, community organizers, and others.

The Minnesota-based, multi-racial, intergenerational delegation attended COP28 with 'observer delegate' status, standing in solidarity with often marginalized frontline communities who bear the brunt of the climate crisis.

"Attending COP28 enabled us to hold world leaders accountable for the commitments made in international climate agreements. By being on-site, we were able to monitor progress and ensure that promises translate into tangible results," shared Carolina Ortiz.

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## South Central Initiative Mankato, Minnesota

Our recent initiatives in Mankato and St. Peter involved several health and resource events. Collaborating with Open Door Health Center and the Minnesota Department of Health, 85 individuals took action to protect themselves and their communities by receiving the updated COVID-19 vaccine.

Last month's workshop *What is Mental Health?*, hosted by COPAL and the Mayo Clinic, empowered nineteen community members with knowledge and resources, reinforcing the significance of mental well-being.

We also reached out to 54 families in the Minnesota towns of Mankato, St. Peter, and Madelia through door knocking efforts, fostering connections with the community and delivering vital resources. Resource tables strategically placed in businesses and institutions, including a collaboration with Lincoln School in Mankato, enabled us to share information about Licenses for All in Minnesota and other resources, engaging and empowering 45 individuals. These initiatives underscore our commitment to the well-being and empowerment of our communities not just in in the Twin Cities, but also in Greater Minnesota.



### Rochester, Minnesota

The Rochester Regional Committee gathered to reflect on the triumphs of 2023, including impactful legislation passed in Minnesota, promising positive changes for the Latines throughout the state. Pastor Itzel Lemus, our committee president, facilitated the meeting. Ryan Pérez, Organizing Director of COPAL, also joined the group to discuss the new law on Paid Medical and Family Leave, answering questions from the community.

Our team also hosted a community vaccination event in Dodge County, organized in collaboration with Torres de Libertad Church in Kasson, Minnesota. A total of 96 individuals protected themselves from COVID-19 by getting vaccinated, and 36 received the flu shot. Together, we continue to empower and uplift our community in Rochester.
